## Stagg Business Students Score Big at the Regional DECA Competition

On Friday, January 19, 2018, the Career Internship students from Mr. Duffy and Ms. Kuypers' classes and other DECA Club members participated in the Regional competition for DECA, a club that helps prepare students as leaders and entrepreneurs for careers in many business areas. The competition has a wide variety of business contests ranging from Accounting Applications to Marketing Management to Sports and Entertainment.

Moraine Valley Community College hosted the event with over 15 different schools and over 350 students participating.

This year, eight students from Stagg finished in the top three in the individual events and qualified for the state competition. State winners then advance to compete at DECA Nationals, which this year will be held in Atlanta, GA. We are very proud of all the students who competed this year.

## Financial Aid Information

College bound seniors and any juniors looking to graduate early should apply for financial aid, if you have not already. You must complete and submit a Free Application for Federal Student Aid, commonly referred to as the FAFSA form, to apply for federal student aid for college and for most state and institutional aid. The FAFSA opened online October 1, 2017. The quickest way to apply is online using FAFSA on the Web at: [www.fafsa.ed.gov](http://www.fafsa.ed.gov)

Additionally, we will continue to offer **FINANCIAL AID FRIDAYS** to all students and parents seeking additional financial aid information. Representatives from ISAC (Illinois Student Assistance Commission), will be available during the lunch periods on select Fridays each month to speak with students and/or parents in the Commons. ISAC's goal is to assist in making college accessible and affordable for all Illinois students. We encourage any students and parents who have questions on how they will be able to afford college to take advantage of these opportunities. ## Senior Seminar

The Orange Team will offer the third and final installment of the Senior Seminar series to the Class of 2018 during the school day on Friday, April 6. The purpose of Senior Seminar is to provide a relevant, life skills curriculum necessary for one's successful journey beyond high school as an active participant in our rapidly changing global community. Previously, the first installment of the Senior Seminar series was hosted by the White Team in November and the Blue Team in March.

## Graduation Requirements/Credit Recovery

Students must successfully complete their grade level identified academic credits to meet District 230 graduation requirements. Please refer to the 2018-19 Course Selection Guide for specific credit requirements. Students have received a copy of their graduation requirements from their counselors. Access to the Course Selection Guide can be found at <http://chsd230.eduk8.me/>

If students fail a required academic class, it will be necessary for students to repeat

the class by re-taking it in summer school. Classes are sequential and cannot be taken without meeting the prerequisite or sequential requirements. Students will not be able to move to the next level class without successfully completing the prior level. To stay on track for graduation, it is imperative for students to attend summer school for credit recovery. There are also accelerated level classes offered in summer school.

## Summer School

Counselors have registered students for first session summer school courses (credit recovery or advancement) during their course selection/registration appointment in January. Counselors will register students for second session summer school courses upon completion of second semester in May. Students and parents/guardians are encouraged to review the summer school website for more information on academic offerings.

Your student will not be enrolled in the course until payment of \$150.00 is received for each applicable session. If payment is not received by the drop dates for Session 1 on March 16

and Session 2 on June 1, your student will not be allowed to attend this class. Please see the summer school information on the district website for class dates and times. 

## Health Services Department

### ATTENTION Parents/Guardians of the Class of 2019:

All children entering 12th grade in the State of Illinois are required to show proof of having received one dose of **Meningococcal (Meningitis)** conjugate vaccine on or after their 16th birthday. If your child received a dose of meningococcal conjugate vaccine before their 16th birthday, he/she will need a second dose. **The following action is needed from you at this time:** Proof of **one** of the following:

- A dose of Meningococcal vaccine was given on or after your child's 16th birthday (only one dose is needed)

**Proof of having received the Meningococcal vaccine is required and must be submitted to the School Nurse as soon as the vaccine is given. We ask that completed forms be turned in no later than April 13, 2018.**

**It is important to note that your child will not be able to receive a schedule, begin the school year on the first day of class, participate in Athletics or apply for a parking spot on campus until proof of having this vaccine is received in the Nurse's Office.**

### Attention Incoming Freshman Class of 2022

It's never too early to start thinking about the required school physical and immunizations for high school. Call your doctor to schedule your appointment early to avoid delays in schedule release.

Freshman Registration on Saturday, February 3, 2018. Any student who did not attend Freshman registration will have the forms mailed to their home. Completed forms are due in the Nurse's Office by **MAY 1, 2018.**

**It is important to note that your child will not be able to receive a schedule, begin the school year on the first day of class or participate in Athletics until a complete physical and immunization record is received in the Nurse's Office.**

### A Few Reminders

There are times when students are sick during the school day and are in contact with their parents via cell phone making arrangements to go home. The problem arises when the Nurse's Office is not aware that arrangements are in place between the parent and student for them to go home. The school policy states "a student who becomes ill during the school day should report to the Nurse's Office". If your child texts you or calls you, please make sure that they report to the Nurse's Office immediately. The Nurse can evaluate them

and expedite their release to you when you arrive. Our primary concern is the health and safety of our students here at Stagg High School. When a parent arrives at the school and the child is not in the Nurse's Office and the Nurse is not aware that the child is ill, there will be a delay before your child is released to you.

Parents, or their designee, need to come **inside** the North (N1) Door and **show a picture ID to the front desk.** At that time, students will be sent up to the North Door from the Nurse's Office.

## Deans

### Students' Belongings

The Deans' Office would like to remind students and parents that it is a student's responsibility to properly secure their phones and other belongings while on buses and on campus at all times of the day. Parents are encouraged to activate any available tracking devices in an effort to assist in the recovery of any missing phones. All missing items should be reported immediately to the Deans' Office. Any item that a student finds should be turned into the Deans' Office immediately so that we can assist in finding its owner. We have many items waiting to be retrieved in the Lost and Found. Please stop there as soon as possible if you are missing an item.

### Parking

Junior students who wish to park during their senior year should pay close attention to announcements about upcoming parking meetings. All Service Learning and Senior Vaccination requirements will need to be fulfilled to park on campus next year. Please refer to the Parent-Student Handbook for more information about on campus parking requirements.

### Practice on Time Behavior

The Deans' Office monitors discipline data frequently to assist us in decision making and determining appropriate interventions for students. Each time data is examined, we see that student tardy violations are our leading cause for a discipline referral. In addition to the time the student loses in instruction for being late to school or to a class, the late arrival causes a disruption to the instructor and other students. Please work with your child to develop good punctuality habits. If he or she is struggling with on time behavior, please work with a member of your team to assist in strategies to prevent him or her from being late.

### Student ID Cards

A reminder that each student must be in possession of his or her ID card at all times at school, for school events, and to ride the bus. If your child has lost his or her ID card, a new one may be purchased for \$2.00 at the Deans' Office. If your child forgot his or her ID card, he or she may obtain a temporary ID card that is valid for one day at the Deans' Office.

## March is "Music in Our Schools" Month

### Why Music?

*(Thanks to The Music Achievement Council)*

**I. Music is a Science.** It is exact, specific, and it demands exact acoustics. A conductor's full score is a chart, a graph that indicates frequencies, intensities, volume changes, melody, and harmony all at once and with the most exact control of time.

**II. Music is Mathematical.** It is rhythmically based on the subdivisions of time into fractions, which must be done instantaneously, not worked out on paper.

**III. Music is a Foreign Language.** Most of the terms are in Italian, German, or French; and the notation is certainly not English - but a highly developed kind of shorthand that used symbols to represent ideas. The semantics of music is the most complete and universal language.

**IV. Music is History.** Music usually reflects the environment and times of its creation, often even the country and/or racial feeling.

**V. Music is Physical Education.** It requires fantastic coordination of fingers, hands, arms, lip, cheek, and facial muscles in addition to extraordinary control of the diaphragmatic, back, stomach, and chest muscles, which respond instantly to the sound the ear hears and the mind interprets.



**VI. Music Develops Insight and Demands Research.**

**VII. Music is all these things, but most of all, Music is Art.** It allows a human being to take all these, dry technically boring, (but difficult) techniques and use them to create emotion. That is one thing science cannot duplicate; humanism, feeling, emotion, call it what you will.

That is why we teach music:

Not because we expect you to major in music  
Not because we expect you to play or sing all your life...

But so you will be human  
So you will recognize beauty  
So you will be closer to an infinite beyond this world

So you will have something to cling to  
So you will have more love, more compassion, more gentleness, more good - in short, more Life.

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## Annual Residency Verification (ARV) for Current Students and Incoming Freshman

In the District's ongoing efforts to be fiscally responsible, all Consolidated High School District 230 students need to show proof of residency within the District boundaries on an annual basis, similar to when students first enrolled at the high school. This procedure was put into place to protect the financial interest of taxpayers in District 230 by assuring that the students who receive an education in our schools are legally entitled to do so.

Incoming freshman start the enrollment process with residency verification at the Registration event in February. This proof of residency will satisfy the requirement for all students in their family. A series of dates and times will be held throughout second semester for parents/guardians to provide the necessary documentation for all other students. Those dates are:

- **Tuesday, March 6, 2018, Noon - 7:00 p.m.**
- **Wednesday, April 11, 2018, 8:00 a.m. - noon and 4:00 p.m. - 8:00 p.m.**
- **Saturday, May 5, 2018, 8:00 a.m. - noon**

Families must present all required documents at the same time; one item from Category A and three items from Category B (more documents are required when completing Consolidated High School District Form E2, if applicable). **Partial paperwork will not be accepted.** All bills presented must be at least 60 days current. The documents provided prove residency as of the first day of the upcoming school year. The District may require a home visit and/or additional documentation to verify residency.

Please contact the Guidance Office at 708-974-7423 if you have any questions or need a District 230 form to complete residency.

### **CATEGORY A: ONE (1) document verifying residency is required:**

- Signed and dated mortgage papers (for new residents only)
- Most recent property tax bill **AND PROOF of payment** (homeowners) (e.g., receipt, cancelled check, 1098 Form) You can obtain a copy of your property tax bill at [cookcountytreasurer.com](http://cookcountytreasurer.com)
- Signed and dated lease **AND PROOF of last month's payment** (renters). Lease must be valid for the first school day of the upcoming school year.
- Letter from manager **AND PROOF of last month's payment** (renters)
- Housing letter (Military Personnel)
- Letter of Residence from landlord (In Lieu of Lease) (District 230 Form 7:60 E1, notarized)
- Letter of Residence when parents are living with another district residence (District Form 7:60-E2, notarized) *Host family must provide additional documentation.*

### **CATEGORY B: THREE (3) documents showing residency address are required (bills must be at least 60 days current):**

- Driver's License
- Vehicle registration
- Voter registration
- Current cable or credit card bill
- Current letter from DHS
- Current homeowners/renters insurance policy and premium payment receipt
- Current gas, electric and/or water bill
- Receipt for moving van rental

For incoming freshman families, in addition to the requirements above, the enrollment documents noted below are also required:

- **STUDENT'S BIRTH CERTIFICATE**
- **SPECIAL CUSTODY DOCUMENTATION (if applicable):**  
Any court order, agreement(s), judgment(s) or divorce decree that awards or gives custody of the child to any person (First page, custody page and signature page only)
